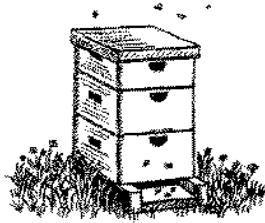

Notes from Your EAS Director

First and foremost (where did I get that from?), I hope to encourage you to attend this year's Eastern Apiculture Society annual meeting and conference in the western hills of Georgia! This year's conference will begin Monday July 31st 2006 with short courses for beginners and advanced beekeepers. The beginners course is entitled "From the Bottom Up" covering biology, the history of our modern hive, honeybee ecology, how to get started, seasonal management, processing of honey, site selection, disease, parasites, pests, nest invaders, pollination, and pollen analysis of honey.

The advanced short course will focus on genetics and breeding, Doolittle's method of queen rearing, advanced re-queening techniques, critical issues of emergency responses regarding Africanized bees and problem bee removal.

The conference begins on Wednesday August 2nd 2006 and runs through Friday August 4th.

The question is not "Will the Africanized honeybee come to our state? But, "When?" And, when they do, then what? Will beekeepers at large be prepared? Will NJ beekeepers be prepared? This years' conference

will spend much time on this matter. The Master beekeepers will be utilized to help us address the public on this issue.

This year's conference will be a world class program. It will also focus on the genetic diversity of the U.S. honeybee population, Australian bees in America, as well as the breeding of Africanized bees in Mexico. Yes, mites continue to be a problem that plagues our bees. Discussion will again address this issue as well. During the conference there will be top notch workshops engaging local, nation, and international speakers each afternoon of the conference.

Young Harris College is in North West Georgia and will be an excellent location for EAS. This year's EAS president (and host) Jennifer Berry is reporting that lecture halls, classrooms, cafeteria and dormitories will all be within easy walking distance. There will be 25 colonies of bees to inspect, learn from, and enjoy. The evening entertainment and dining on Wednesday night will include a hog (not a pig) roast, bluegrass music, and country boils. Thursday night will feature Celtic music and silent auction. Friday will feature a banquet featuring a "Southern Ball"- Yes, Costumes are requested! The group in Georgia is working hard to make this a fun and learning time for all.

If you don't want to stay on the Young Harris' campus there are many Bed and Breakfast's as well as cabins and the like for rent as well as motels in the in the area. There is camping available for those who enjoy the outdoors in this picturesque part of our country. Meals this year will be purchased

individually when you register. Registration begins the middle of May, and is also available online at easternapiculture.org.

If you would like to visit EAS, this year in Georgia please contact me (Dave) at 856-981-9483, or utilize the EAS homepage 2006 conference. It will list all the speakers, honeyshow rules (please note the rules are different this year). In short, they will be utilizing European rules. See you there!

Other EAS notes: EAS Master Beekeepers will soon be required to recertify their "active status" regarding the responsibilities within beekeeping and EAS. This is to insure that Master Beekeepers are on the cutting edge of new knowledge and able to assist the small beeper to the larger commercial operations.

WANTED: NEW BEEKEEPERS IN NEW JERSEY
New Program Offers Beekeeping Start-up Assistance
February 14, 2006

(TRENTON) – The New Jersey Department of Agriculture, in partnership with the New Jersey Beekeepers Association and Cook College – Rutgers University, today announced a program to encourage new beekeepers in the state.

“Insect pollination is vital to many important fruit and vegetable crops grown in New Jersey, such as apples, blueberries, cantaloupes, cranberries, cucumbers, squash, pumpkins and watermelons, which account for \$115.8 million in revenue each year,” said New Jersey Secretary of Agriculture Charles M. Kuperus. “This investment in this cooperative venture will help our honeybee industry grow and contribute to sustaining the fruit and vegetable farmers who depend on honeybees for pollination of their crops.”

The “Bee-ginner’s Beekeeping Program” will offer starter hives and basic beekeeping equipment, worth up to \$300, for first-time beekeepers who successfully complete the 2006 “Bee-ginning Beekeepers” course, offered by the Cook College Office of Continuing Professional Education. They also will be encouraged to join the New Jersey Beekeepers Association. Participants must be New Jersey residents and at least 10 years old.

“Beehives are moved all over the country to perform their essential roles in pollination, especially in tree nut, vegetable and fruit crops,” said Bob Goodman, executive dean of Cook College and the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station. “Unfortunately, due to two very destructive pests, the tracheal and Varro mites, bee populations have declined in numbers over recent decades. These pests have caused major shortages of bees in New Jersey and neighboring states. The New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station is committed to addressing this problem so that adequate bee populations will be available for pollination in the future.”

The Department of Agriculture, through a grant, is underwriting the cost of the starter hives and beekeeping equipment for program participants. The State Apiarist and apiary inspectors will examine the newly established beehives and offer recommendations and assistance to new beekeepers. Beekeeping equipment will be provided through registered New Jersey bee supply dealers. The program will be limited to the first 50 qualified participants. Participants will be encouraged to attend local Beekeepers Association branch meetings for continuing education and outreach. The eight regional branches of the New Jersey Beekeepers Association will assist in mentoring Bee-Ginner participants and providing technical assistance throughout the following year, to ensure that the new beekeepers get a successful start. The

Department of Agriculture will provide financial assistance to the New Jersey Beekeepers Association in their mentoring effort.

"Because of this program, several students who attend the Rutgers beekeeping short course will be able to get their start in keeping bees," said Bob Hughes, President of the New Jersey Beekeepers Association. "Also, with more new beekeepers, there is a chance that some of them will become interested enough to become what we call 'Commercial Beekeepers,' who make a living renting bees to crop farmers who require bees for good crop production."

There has been a drop in beekeepers in New Jersey in the last several years from an estimated four to five thousand to a present estimate of about 2,500.

The New Jersey Agricultural Statistics Service reports that in 2004 there were 12,000 honey-producing bee colonies in the state, which yielded 324,000 pounds of honey. The value of production was \$447,000.

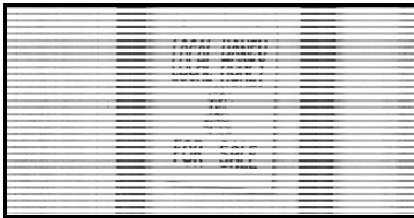

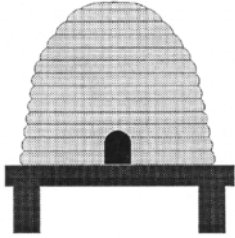

The greatest threat to the honeybee is negligence. The lack of proper care for colonies by beekeepers can lead to a spiral of negative effects. Whether through inexperience or a general lack of time, honeybee colonies can become prone to sickness. To prevent this issue and its spread, keeping up with current techniques for disease treatment, education and bee inspectors are necessary. This way the worst enemy of the honeybee can be overcome!
